In the Welsh capital, Cardiff, celebrations are held at the Cardiff Civic Centre which include live music, fireworks, ice skating and fairground rides. It is customary to give gifts of bread and cheese in Wales at New Year.

New Year's Eve in Ireland is celebrated by gathering family and friends together and enjoying small parties in their homes. Some of the larger cities, such as Belfast and Dublin, hold special New Year's events for people to enjoy.
