Charlie and the Chocolate Factory

In this movie from 2005, a young boy wins a tour through the most magnificent chocolate factory in the world, led by the world's most unusual candy maker.

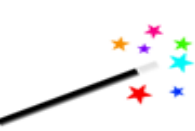
Young Charlie Bucket comes from an incredibly poor family for whom it seems nothing will go right. Their lives get turned around when Charlie wins an amazing prize: a tour of Wonka's wondrous chocolate factory and, more importantly for the starving Bucket family, a life-time supply of sweets. Once the tour starts, Charlie (and the viewer) is sent on an incredible adventure into an almost-unbelievable world filled with magical inventions, singing oompa-loompas and four of the worst children you've ever met.

Based on Roald Dahls' beloved children's novel of the same name, the movie succeeds in creating a visual treat for the eyes as the set designers and costumers have been allowed to let their imaginations run wild. The central figure of Mr Willy Wonka is played in a delightfully weird way by Johnny Depp. The addition of a backstory between Wonka and his father (the magnificent Christopher Lee) adds a touch of emotion to the otherwise wacky chocolate maker.

While the songs of the oompa-loompas are all taken directly from the pages of the book this time, it must be said that they just aren't as catchy as the Gene Wilder version from the 1970s.

Overall, this movie is a hit. If you are a fan of Dahl's books, chocolate or just movies in general, then this is a must-see for you.

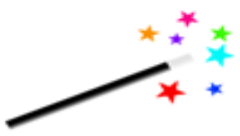

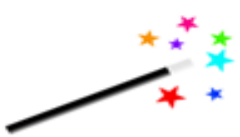
Mulan

After watching the recent live-action version, I was inspired to go back and watch Disney's original animated feature-film. "Mulan" is one of Disney's last "hand-drawn" animated works from before it bought Pixar and started exclusively producing computer-animated films and pre-teen pop starlets. The animation here is certainly nice when compared to Disney's television shows, but like other Disney cartoons from this era (Pocahontas, The Emperor's New Groove) the lines are simple, the colours are a bit flat and the cast seems to be on auto-pilot.

Eddie Murphy isn't laugh-out-loud hilarious, but he's the only saving grace of the film. He voices a sassy supporting role, Mulan's pet dragon and best friend, and is the only entertaining part of the film.

The film's not unwatchable, it's just really, really average. The use of the CGI makes it clear that Disney was just about finished with their standard hand-drawn animated works. But Mulan comes nowhere close to any of Disney's back catalogue. To any parents looking for a good Disney animated film to watch with their kids, go for anything made before Pocahontas. Mulan is lacking in the departments of charm, pacing, song-writing and memorability.
