Suffix -ous

Please can you practise these spellings for next week?

These words contain the suffix -ous which is most often used to change concrete nouns (palpable things) to abstract nouns (qualities).

1. -our is changed to -or before -ous is added.
2. A final 'e' of the root word must be kept if the /dʒ/ sound of 'g' is to be kept.
3. If there is an /i:/ sound before the -ous ending, it is usually spelt as i, but a few words have e.
